Imprisonment today

Imprisonment today is at the highest rates per capita. Women and children are the fastest growing prison population. Indigenous and African American peoples are the most overrepresented groups in prison.

Prisoners, advocates, academics, and experts alike know that these trends reflect a reality that goes well beyond simple levels of 'crime'. Many social problems today are the result of deeply entrenched and persistent forms of poverty, violence, inequality and discrimination.

End the penal crisis

ICOPA is a forum that recognises the need to challenge individual punitive responses that ignore and exacerbate social problems. People sentenced to prison are serving longer sentences; prison authorities are less accountable to the community; prisoners are losing basic human and legal rights and are open to commodification and commercial exploitation. Prisons are built at a pace never before imagined. State interference and abolition of basic human liberties delivers more powers to police and intelligence agencies.
